Thomas J. Christensen is James T. Shotwell Professor of International Relations and Director of the China and the World program in the School of International and Public Affairs at Columbia University. From 2006 to 2008, he served as U.S. Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for East Asian and Pacific Affairs, with responsibility for relations with China, Taiwan, and Mongolia. He is a Senior Non-Resident Fellow at the Brookings Institution, a life Member of the Council on Foreign Relations, and editor of the Nancy B. Tucker and Warren I. Cohen book series on the United States in Asia at the Columbia University Press. He received a Distinguished Public Service Award from the U.S. Department of State.

Abstract: This talk will address what challenges China's rise does and does not pose to the United States, its allies and partners, and to multilateral international institutions and norms. Issues to be discussed will be China's military modernization, trends in Beijing's economic policies, China's behavior in its multiple sovereignty disputes, and China's policies toward existing and new multilateral institutions.
